Turnaround Arts is a signature program of the President’s Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, empowering high-need, low performing schools with innovative arts programs and arts integration strategies. In its second year, Turnaround Arts Hawai`i supported its three schools – Kalihi Kai Elementary School, Wai`anae Elementary School, and Kamaile Academy PCS – with resources and training to strategically use the arts to meet each school’s goals.
