BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

Budget Execution policies from the Administration through the Department of Budget & Finance and DAGS are issued at the beginning of the fiscal year. The SFCA operational expenditure plan, reflecting the agency's implementation of all expenditures during the year, is expected to be prepared in August and submitted for departmental and administrative approval. Budget highlights include the following discussion points:

DISCUSSION

- 1. To date, Budget and Finance has not imposed a percentage reduction from the Legislative budget.
- 2. On July 6, 2022, the Governor announced line-item vetoes for HB1600 Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Relief Funds (CSFRF) including appropriations to SFCA to support the Creative Workforce Grant (\$500,000) and the Culture Fellowship Grant (\$200,000). SFCA intends to re-apply to the Administration to release the funds once B&F releases instructions.
- 3. Biennium Grants currently has a projected budget of \$395,000 funding 27 organizations.
- 4. All 124 schools that applied to Artists in the Schools (AITS) will be funded for a total of \$897,800 including \$270,000 from Hawaii Community Foundation.
- 5. No new positions for SFCA were included in HB1600 HD1 SD2 CD1
- 6. Bishop Museum and 'Iolani Palace received General Fund line items. Funds to be administered following issuance of instructions from the Administration through the Department of Budget and Finance.
- 7. NEA Federal Fund increased to \$805,300.

RECOMMENDATION

The agency's priorities as determined by our strategic plan and the vision of our Executive Director and the Foundation's staff are represented in the preparation of this budget. We recommend **approval of the budget as presented, with the provision that the Executive Director has the authority to make adjustments as needed**. The Executive Director will notify the board if there are significant changes to the budget.

State Foundation on Culture and the Arts Biennium Grants Program STAFF RECOMMENDATION July 20, 2022

FACTS:

Project Title: Biennium Grants Program

Project Staff: Brittany Rakowitz, Community Arts Coordinator

Statute/Policy/Procedure: The Biennium Grants Program follows Chapters 3-92 to 3-93 HRS concerning panel and application administration, including Chapter 9-11 for applicant eligibility purposes.

What: Revision of the eligibility requirements to the Biennium Grants Program, which supports the projects and programs of eligible nonprofit 501(c)3 arts and culture organizations.

When: Effective the Biennium Grants Fiscal Year 2024 & Fiscal Year 2025 opening of the <u>Intent to Apply</u>-August 1, 2022.

Where: Eligible nonprofit arts and culture organizations are located statewide, and many include neighbor islands in their program outreach.

Who: Provide support through the Biennium Grants Program to nonprofit 501(c)3 arts and culture organizations per Chapter 9 and Chapter 42 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes and eliminate eligibility for the University of Hawaii Departments and Divisions.

Why: The Biennium Grants Program is intended to support nonprofit arts and culture organizations with limited resources, are underserved, and have no access to funding opportunities through the State Legislature. The University of Hawai`i is not a nonprofit 501(c)3 arts or culture organization. Due to the University of Hawai`i being a State-funded entity, the SFCA provided an eligibility exception.

Based on communications with the State Deputy Attorney General, there is no requirement that the SFCA provide funding to the University of Hawaii through the Biennium Grants Program. As a State entity, the University of Hawai'i has access to funding opportunities from the State Legislature.

Biennium Grants Program Eligibility Instructions for Applicants

APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY

Non-Profit Organization, 501(c)3, exempt from federal income tax by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Applicants are subject to meeting Chapter 9 eligibility requirements and policies established by the Hawai`i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts.

TO SUBMIT

- All Non-Profit Arts and Culture Organizations must submit legal eligibility documentation for review.
- 1. A copy of the organization's tax exempt status letter from the IRS; and
- 2. A copy of the organization's bylaws and/or policies which must include:
 - a. A description of the manner in which business is conducted;
 - b. A prohibition against nepotism; and
 - c. Procedures for managing potential conflict-of-interest situations.
 - d. A statement from the organization affirming that the members of its governing board have no material conflict of interest and serve without compensation. (The organization must have a governing board whose members have no material conflict of interest and serve without compensation.)

Prepare ONE COMPILED PDF file. Your documents MUST be in the following order:

- 1. IRS letter of determination of tax-exempt status.
- 2. Articles or Charter of Incorporation.
- 3. Bylaws; bylaws amendments.
- 4. Corporate Resolutions or Corporate Policies (if any).

Your file MUST be named as follows:

REQUEST: Approval from the SFCA Board of Commissioners for the following: Funding recommendations from the 2022-2023/2024 Artists in the Schools Grants Panel.

FACTS:

Project Title: Artists in the Schools (AITS) Program 2022-2023/2024

Project Staff: Danica Rosengren, Arts Program Specialist

Statute/Policy/Procedure: The AITS Program follows the Hawai`i Administrative Rules, Chapters 3-92 to 3-93 concerning panel and application administration.

What: Each public and charter school in the state can apply annually to the SFCA for a PreK-12 arts residency grant. Schools are required to use an artist from the SFCA Artistic Teaching Partners Roster. Roster information is updated annually. After hosting a town hall with teaching artists and school partners, we decided to adjust the program this year so that schools could apply for either one year or two year grants.

There are two types of AITS grants:

- General AITS Grant: Maximum \$7,500 which was increased by \$500 this year that is specifically for Professional Development. The required school match for this grant was removed for this year to encourage participation and reduce boundaries of entry.
- Arts in Public Places (APP) AITS Grant: \$8,500 which was increased by \$500 this year that is specifically for Professional Development. No school match is required for this grant. The residency focuses on interpreting a piece from our public work collection through the art form of the teaching artist. The goal is to increase the students' appreciation of, and engagement with our public art collection. While previously this focused on just Public Works of Arts at the school, we expanded it so that more schools could apply for an APP grant.

SFCA announced the opening of the 2022-2023/2024 AITS online GO Smart application

process in December 2021 through a letter emailed to every DOE school principal and complex superintendent. The same information was emailed to all teaching artists on the Artistic Teaching Partners Roster, as well as spread through the DOE webpage. Application guidelines and forms were posted on the SFCA website.

The deadline for the grant was originally April 3rd, however we extended the deadline to June 5th due to ARTS FIRST Partners advising that schools were too ovewhelmed during this school year to write a grant. Therefore, we instead implemented an Intent to Apply due April 18th, so we could ensure we knew how many applications we would receive, and how much funding would be asked for. Last year, we received 97 AITS applications. This year, we received 124 applications.

We conducted our panels on zoom for the third time, which reduced paper-packet preparations, and saved cost on travel and food. For the second time, we held two panels, one for APP AITS Grants, and one for General AITS Grants. This allowed us to go a little further in depth to discuss mor applications, without feeling pressed for time. During the AITS Panel, one of the panelists requested access to all the applications, not just the ones they had scored. By giving access to all of the applications, the entire panel was able to look over the apps in real time, and provide additional thoughts to those discussed. We implemented this practice for he General AITS Grants panel as well, and in both of the panels everyone was engaged and participated throughout.

The Hawaii Community Foundation (HCF) has contributed matching funds since 2008-2009 with direct funding to the Artistic Teaching Partner 501(c)(3) organizations that are working with the selected AITS schools.

Why: The SFCA began administering the AITS Program in school year 2007-2008. Prior to that, the program was administered by the Hawaii Department of Education (DOE). Most elementary schools in Hawaii do not have arts specialists even though the arts are considered a core subject, hence most of the applications serve elementary grades. AITS offers residencies in dance, drama, music, literary arts and visual arts with highly qualified teaching artists. Under the SFCA, over 12,000 children and 500 teachers in approximately/over 100 schools are serviced each year.

When: AITS SY2022-23/2024 timeline

- Application launch December 14, 2022
- Online application deadline (GO Smart) June 5th, 2022
- Panel meetings June 28th and June 29th, 2022
- Implementation grant period School Year 2022-2023/2024
- Interim Report due- for one-year grantees, prior to their Final Report, for two year grantees June 30, 2023
- Final reports due For One Year Grantees: 30 days after the last residency for the school or July 30, 2023, whichever is earliest. For Two Year Grantees: 30 days after the last residency for the school or July 30, 2024, whichever is earliest.

Where: AITS residencies are statewide on 6 islands (see additional data attached).

How: 124 eligible grant applications were received and reviewed by the AITS grants panels.

Budget:

SFCA General Funds: \$133,900 SFCA Federal Funds: \$85,000 SFCA Special Funds: \$408,900 Hawaii Community Foundation: \$270,000 TOTAL AITS \$897,800

DISCUSSION:

There were a few applications with vague responses, or for the APP grants, did not clearly state how they would tie in the piece of art from the collection. This year, we continued the process that for those applications with much room to grow, we would approve them on the condition that they do specific rewrites requested by the panelists. There are five applications that have been approved conditionally. There were a few applications where there was a 15+ point variance. We focused our time going through these applications, to hear the different perspectives. During each panel, there was discussion about the community the teaching artist was serving, and how they incorporate positionality into their teaching. This is not a question currently on the application, but will be included for future years to ensure culturally responsive teaching is taking place. This year, we will continue the practice that teaching artists can request feedback on their applications, as the panelists wrote their notes with the knowledge that the applicants may read their comments.

Final results:

 Panelists recommended that all 124 applications be funded, with recommended follow up for 3 APP Grant applications and 2 General Grant applications (highlighted in yellow on the attached list.


